

Proud Middletown Alumni Enjoy 100 Years of Football Celebration



On October 25, 2019, Middletown High School North hosted the “100 Years of Football in Middletown” celebration prior to the home game against Mater Dei Prep. It was in 1919 that Middletown Township High School embarked on its first year of playing football at the high school level. The pride and tradition that season created still exist today at Middletown High School North, Middletown High School South and Mater Dei Prep.



The free, informal gathering was open to all former gridders and cheerleaders who attended any high school in Middletown. The original school was affectionately known as Leonardo High School before being recognized as Middletown Township High School (MTHS) in the early 1950's. Overcrowding at the school on Tindall Road resulted in the need for two high schools. In the fall of 1976, the school split and Middletown High School South and Middletown High School North were an outgrowth. Mater Dei High School started

playing football in 1963. In honor of this milestone, the celebration of the Centennial was held from 4:45 pm until 6:45 pm in the Wall of Champions area in the gymnasium at Middletown High School North.

Following the gathering, all alumni were introduced at midfield prior to the coin toss of the Mater Dei Prep versus Middletown North football game. Included among the attendees were football players and cheerleaders from as far back as 1943!





An Interview with the Class of 2020 Valedictorian: Jada Tulloch

The 2019-2020 school year grades have become final and the ranking of the students has now been decided. Let's give a huge congratulations to Jada Tulloch for being named Middletown High School North's Valedictorian for the class of 2020.



Below is The Lion's Roar Q&A session with Valedictorian Jada Tulloch.

What is your GPA [Grade Point Average]?

My GPA is a 4.0.

What would you say about the classes you have taken senior year?

The classes I have taken senior year have reinforced my desire to pursue studies in environmental/sustainable development sciences, medicine, and social justice in the future. By taking AP Environmental I was able to gain knowledge not only about modern-day environmentalist initiatives, but also the underlying fundamental sciences that correlate to actions being taken to protect the environment. In AP Psychology I learned more about the direct relationship between mental and physical health, as well as the monumental reforms in treatment and medicine that continue to pave the way of healthcare advancement today. In AP Literature and Composition we discussed so much more than how to formulate a college-style essay. The texts we analyzed that documented influential social revolutions and movements, really inspired me to put more effort into educating myself outside of school about the pressing social injustices of contemporary society and about ways to make progressive change. These discussions of differences in people and cultures throughout history were also prevalent in my AP Spanish class. With today's social and political climate, AP Statistics was the major class I took senior year that felt most applicable to "the real world." I think it's really important for people to understand the math behind everything that

we read on social media or see in the news, and understand how powerful statistical significance is, when advocating for reform. Including AP Biology and AP Calculus, all of the classes I have taken senior year have been very challenging, but also extremely informative and stimulating.

While still talking about classes I was curious to see what pushed the number one student to her limits.

What was the hardest class you have taken over these past four years?

The hardest class I have taken over these past four years was AP Physics junior year. I do not have a natural 'physics brain', and initially not understanding a lot of the material was very discouraging for me. Everything felt very foreign, but after really dedicating my time to getting extra help from my teacher and talking through what I was confused about, I realized physics was only as hard as I made it.

So, Jada, what do you do outside of school to help you relax?

Outside of school, I like hiking and painting to help myself relax. 2020 Hall of Fame Class Announced

The Middletown High School North Hall of Fame Committee has announced the selection of the 2020 Hall of Fame class. The seventeen member committee narrowed their final list to twenty six before casting their final votes for this year's inductees. In order to be inducted, nominees must receive a 75% "yes" vote by the committee. This year's group features some very talented Middletown North and Middletown Township High School athletes that have left their impact on the Middletown community. The 2020 class features twelve selections and the Distinguished Alumni Award winner that will be recognized during the Hall of Fame Ceremony during the Fall at Middletown High School North.


This year's inductees are as follows:

Heather Beam (1992)

One of the most decorated gymnasts in MHSN history, Heather was a three time All-Shore selection (1988-1990), including being selected as a 1st Team choice her sophomore year and 2nd Team All-Shore as a freshman and junior.

Danielle Freshnock (2010)

Danielle was recognized as an All-Shore selection in Field Hockey and also was a member of the 2006 State Championship team. For her career, she had 74 goals and 49 assists for 197 points.



Mike Galos (1988-1999)

Mike Galos garnered 53 wins as the Head Football Coach of the Lions. This still ranks him as the third winningest coach in over 100 seasons on the gridiron for the Orange and Black.

Bob Girardin (1963)

Bob Girardin's emergence as one of the best players in the Shore coincided with the Lions returning to a basketball status they had not exhibited since 1957. His 37 points against Lakewood stood as a school record for 54 years until current Lion ace, Rob Higgins, notched 41 points against Middletown South in 2017!

Jim Griffin (1965)

In 1964, Griffin was one of the outstanding performers as Coach Dick Kleva's football team finished undefeated and finished ranked 4th in the state. In baseball, he was one of the leading hitters and paced the orange and black to a 17-3 mark, the best ever recorded in school history at that time.

Jeff Karpell (1995)

Jeff was a 1995 graduate who played under legendary coach Rich Veth. He holds the school's career batting average record of .455 and went on to star for Fairleigh Dickinson at the collegiate level.

Julie Lanco (2008)

One of the few athletes to be recognized as a 4-time APP All-Shore Selection, Lanco was a member of the state champion 2005 soccer team under Coach Nagy. Julie was recognized by the US Soccer Team and was named 2006 Asbury Park Press Player of the Year.

Bart Lyon (1973)

Bart Lyon has fired some sensational rounds in his four-year golf career, including 63 at Tomahawk, 66 at Beacon Hill, 68 at Jumping Brook and 69 at Asbury Park Golf and Country

Club. He was the Lions' first-ever individual state champion!

Mark Mager (1998)

Mager was a two-time MVP (1997-1998), was undefeated (14-0) as a pitcher and holds virtually every batting record. He still holds the record for Career Hits (127), Runs (97), Doubles (31), Triples (7), RBI (74) and At Bats (284).

Bonnie O'Connor (1977)

O'Connor was a standout softball player during the 1976 and 1977 seasons. She earned All-Shore recognition her junior and senior season and lettered in four sports.

Jessica Portelli Gavini (1993)

Gavini was a 4-year starter for the Lions Girls Soccer team. She holds the record for the most shutouts in a single season with 14 in 1992 when the team went undefeated with a 19-0 record.

Eric Youncofski (2012)

Yuncofski was captain and point guard for the 2012 NJSIAA State Championship basketball team. He was recognized as a two-time All-Shore and All-Division selection.

Distinguished Alumni Award:

Ronald Christman (1955)

As an athlete, Christman lettered in football, baseball, basketball and track. He was a member of the 1952 Shore Conference Championship football team that went 9-0 on the season while outscoring opponents 196-33. Ronald was Leonardo's top pole vaulter and held three track records until the 1980's. After graduation, Ronald enlisted in the United States Army and served proudly during the Korean War.

Red Bank Crop Hunger Walk 2019

RED BANK-On Sunday, October 20, 2019 citizens from various communities in New Jersey walked for five miles through Red Bank, Little Silver and Fair Haven in an effort to end hunger. The event began at Red Bank Regional High School at 2 PM and there was live music from “The Wag Band,” as well as water stops and refreshments along the way.

The CROP Walk tradition began approximately fifty years ago in 1969 in Bismarck, North Dakota. Thousands of people raised \$25,000 to help fight hunger in their area. Now, Red Bank and its surrounding communities continue the tradition of the annual walk to raise money to help combat hunger locally. According to the Red Bank CROP Hunger Walk website, they’ve collectively raised \$100,000 in funds each year since 2000. Twenty five percent of the money raised is returned to fighting hunger in local communities and the rest of the money is donated to the Church World Service who works to fight hunger globally.

Currently, there are fifteen local partner programs that sponsor this walk, including Lunch Break, AACC Local Food Pantry and Bayshore Lunch Program. Additionally, participants can donate and raise money online to help support their cause. Another way people can help support this cause is by donating non-perishable food items such as rice, peanut butter, and beans to the food collections located at the start and finish of the walk.

Many came out to support the cause and the Red Bank Crop Walk was largely successful in its endeavor to fight hunger.
